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1. Policy Introduction

Trusted Companionship, the trading name of AI Auto-Tech Ltd, is committed to ensuring the safety of service users, companions, volunteers, and staff in all environments where companionship services are delivered. Fire safety is a critical component of safeguarding, risk management, and operational responsibility.

Companions frequently work in private homes, community settings, and unfamiliar environments. This policy outlines how Trusted Companionship prevents, identifies, and responds to fire risks to ensure the safety of all individuals involved.

2. Key Principles

- **Safety first:** Fire safety is a non-negotiable priority.
- **Prevention:** Proactive identification and reduction of fire hazards.

3. Policy Statement

Trusted Companionship ensures that all companions are trained, equipped, and supported to identify fire risks, respond appropriately to fire emergencies, and protect service users from harm. Companions must follow fire safety procedures, maintain vigilance, and report hazards immediately.

Companions must never:

- Attempt to extinguish large fires
- Enter dangerous environments
- Ignore fire hazards
- Block exits or escape routes
- Use unsafe electrical equipment

4. Purpose

- Protect service users, companions, and families from fire-related harm
- Establish clear fire safety procedures
- Ensure companions can identify and report fire hazards
- Promote safe evacuation practices
- Strengthen compliance with fire safety legislation
- Support multi-agency coordination during emergencies

5. Scope

7. Definitions

Fire Hazard: Any condition that increases the likelihood of fire.

Evacuation: Safe movement of individuals away from danger.

Fire Emergency: Any situation involving smoke, fire, or imminent risk requiring immediate action.

DSL: Designated Safeguarding Lead responsible for managing fire-related safeguarding concerns.

8. Companion Responsibilities

8.1 Fire Awareness

Companions must be able to:

- Identify fire hazards
- Recognise unsafe electrical setups
- Notice blocked exits
- Identify flammable materials stored improperly
- Observe smoking risks or oxygen equipment hazards

8.2 Prevention

Companions must:

- Encourage safe practices
- Report hazards immediately
- Avoid using unsafe appliances
- Ensure escape routes remain clear
- Avoid leaving cooking unattended

8.3 Evacuation

In case of fire:

- Stay calm
- Evacuate service users safely
- Avoid lifts
- Do not re-enter the building
- Call emergency services
- Follow the service user's home fire plan if available

8.4 Communication

Companions must:

- Inform the office immediately

- Document the incident
- Support service users emotionally
- Cooperate with emergency responders

8.5 Professional Boundaries

Companions must **not**:

- Fight fires beyond small, manageable flames
- Use fire extinguishers unless trained
- Move heavy furniture
- Perform rescue operations beyond safe capacity

9. Identifying Fire Hazards

Common hazards include:

- Overloaded sockets
- Damaged wiring
- Candles left unattended
- Smoking indoors
- Clutter blocking exits
- Oxygen tanks near flames
- Faulty heaters
- Cooking left unattended
- Excessive use of extension leads

Companions must report hazards immediately.

10. Fire Safety in Different Settings

10.1 Private Homes

- Respect the home environment
- Encourage safe practices
- Identify risks discreetly
- Report concerns sensitively

10.2 Overnight Companionship

- Ensure escape routes are known
- Keep phone charged
- Maintain awareness of fire alarms
- Avoid using high-risk appliances

10.3 Holiday Companionship

- Familiarise with hotel fire exits
- Follow local fire safety rules
- Avoid cooking in unsafe spaces

10.4 Transport

- Ensure vehicles are safe
- Report mechanical issues
- Avoid transporting flammable materials

11. Safeguarding Considerations

Fire safety concerns may indicate:

- Domestic abuse
- Environmental risk factors

Companions must report safeguarding concerns immediately.
